Part 1 who is responsible for delivering different services?

City

Administrator or Manager

- Generally responsible for oversight of all city departments on behalf of a council or mayor
- Acts as a liaison between the department directors and the council, thus providing a direct link and advocate for both groups
- Sometimes directly responsible for the finance department
- Appointed in a council-manager form of city government
- Oversight of all hiring, firing, disciplining and suspensions
- Preparation, monitoring, and execution of the city budget, which includes submitting each year to the council a proposed budget package with options and recommendations for its consideration and possible approval
- Main technical advisor to the council on overall governmental operations
- Public relations, such as meeting with citizens, citizen groups, businesses, and other stakeholders (the presence of a mayor may alter this function somewhat)
- Operating the city with a professional understanding of how all city functions operate together to their best effect
- Attends all council meetings, but does not have any voting rights
- Additional duties that may be assigned by the council

Public Works

- Provides many of the basic services that affect the daily lives of everyone who lives and works in the city
- Responsible for managing the many different projects and facilities funded by the city
 - The administration, planning, maintenance, construction management and technical engineering of the city's infrastructure
- Broad category of infrastructure projects, financed and constructed by the government, for recreational, employment, and health and safety uses in the greater community
 - Public buildings (municipal buildings, schools, hospitals)
 - Transportation infrastructure (roads, railroads, bridges, pipelines, canals, ports, airports)
 - Public spaces (public squares, parks, beaches)
 - Public services (water supply, sewage, electrical grid, dams)
 - Parks (if the city does not have a parks department)
 - Water quality maintenance
 - Coordinates utility capacity
 - Fleet Maintenance
 - Stormwater Management
 - Streets and Drainage
 - Wastewater Collection
 - Water Distribution
 - Water / Sewer Maintenance
 - Sanitation
 - Traffic Division
 - Building, Plumbing, Electrical and Mechanical Permit and Inspections
 - Code Enforcement
 - Animal Control
 - Engineering
 - Floodplain Management
 - Maintains the city's Infrastructure Design Manual
 - Mosquito spraying

City continued

Traffic and Transportation

- Responsible for overseeing the transportation infrastructure
 - Installation, operation and maintenance of traffic signs, signalized intersections, school zone flashers, streetlights, freeway lights, pavement markings, under bridge lights, etc.
- Responsible for performing engineering studies, plan reviews, and field investigations related to traffic counts, street lighting, school zones, speed humps, railroad safety and quiet zones, view obstructions, neighborhood cut-through traffic, and Capital Improvement Plans (CIP)
- Manages street and lane closure permits, develops general speed and school zone ordinances, and coordinates with the local police department to help alleviate traffic congestion hot spots

Parks

- Responsible for installation, operation and maintenance of all city owned recreational centers, parks, ball fields, swimming pools and other city owned athletic facilities
- Develops and implements recreational programming for citizens of all abilities
- Some parks departments are in charge of facility rentals by the general public
 - Please see your cities policies on reservations for indoor and outdoor facilities
- Some cities have their parks department within their public works and engineering department. Please see you specific city's website to determine this.

Planning

- Responsible for the implementation of a variety of ordinances, policies, contracts, programs and studies
- Provides the general public and the city with the information and guidance, in order to lead to
 effective future land development and economic growth, through long range and comprehensive
 planning
- Provides quality customer service to residents, businesses, organizations, neighborhoods and decision-makers through research, data, mapping and analysis
- Provides tools and resources to strengthen and increase the long-term viability of neighborhoods
- Regulates land development in the city and the extra territorial jurisdiction (ETJ)
- Reviews, investigates and promotes land regulation policies for the changing demands to the city's growth and quality of life
- Guides land development inside the city and the city's ETJ by using several city ordinances such as:
 - Subdivision Ordinances
 - Zoning Ordinances
 - Off-Street Parking Ordinances
 - Landscaping Ordinances
 - Sign Ordinances
 - Cell Phone Tower Ordinances
 - Park Ordinances

City continued

Finance

- General responsibility for the financial administration of the city
- Provides managerial, analytical, and administrative support for all the departments of the city
- Provides financial leadership and expertise to enable compliance with legal and policy requirements and support strategic decisions for the city's initiatives to proactively ensure that all resources are managed and accounted for in an effective and efficient manner
- Accountable to manage the city's finances in a responsible manner
- Produce an accurate and timely financial report
- Develop and implement the financial policies of the city
- Its functions include:
 - Budget preparation, coordination, and monitoring for compliance
 - Payment of all invoices
 - Providing for centralized cash receipts and accounts receivable
 - Purchasing goods and services on behalf of the city
 - Recording and documenting all financial transactions, fund investments, and debt management
 - Risk management
 - Tax collection

Water District

- Government entity that provides limited services to its customers and residents depending on the district's type
- A district may be created by the TCEQ or the county commissioners court for "general law" districts
- If a district must be created or altered by an act of Legislature, it is a "special law" district

Municipal Utility District (MUD)

- Engages in the supply of water, conservation, irrigation, drainage, fire fighting, solid waste (garbage) collection and disposal (including recycling activities), wasterwater (sewage) treatment and recreational facilities
- Prohibited from issuing bonds to pay for parks or recreational facilities but they can develop, maintain and acquire parks or recreational facilities and charge a user fee

Independent School District (ISD)

- Implementing the state's system of public education and ensuring student performance in accordance with the state's education code

Management District

- Special districts created by the Texas legislature
- Empowered to promote, develop, encourage and maintain employment, commerce, transportation, housing, tourism, recreation, arts, entertainment, economic development, safety and the public welfare
- Given the power to finance their operations by issuing bonds or other obligations, payable in whole or in part from ad valorem taxes, assessments, impact fees, or other funds of the District to provide improvements and services
- Districts may not levy a tax or assessment on single-family detached residences
- Districts may levy a tax only after holding an election within the district
- Districts are intended to supplement, not supplant, existing public services

Community Development Corporation (CDC)

- Typically non-profit organizations
- Builds a community-based strategic plan to set goals of development within a specific community
- Creates innovative, environmentally friendly, and socially responsible housing
- Promotes economic growth that complements the needs of the neighborhood's residents
- Assists specific areas in reaching specific economic and community goals to serve the best interest of its citizens and guests
- Responsible for promoting the economic growth and diversification

Economic Development Corporation (CDC)

- · Responsible for attracting businesses and creating job opportunities in cities

Law Enforcement

Sheriff

- Chief law enforcement officer for the county and is elected every four years
- Responsible for the operation of the county correctional center, but must consult with the director of the community supervision and corrections department serving the county about issues relating to probationers participating in county correctional center programs
- Countywide jurisdiction, but in practice, most sheriffs' offices concentrate their activities outside city limits where municipal officers cannot operate
- Provides law enforcement services to residents
- Responsible for operating the county jails, investigating crimes, making arrests, enforcing traffic regulations on county roads and maintaining security in both the county and district courts
- Independent and not responsible to other agencies except in the matter of an operating budget, which must be approved by the Commissioner's Court
- Performs such varied duties as enforcing estray laws, collecting fines and court costs, conducting court-ordered sales of real estate or other items, providing security of the district and county courts, serving of civil and criminal process such as subpoenas, warrants, capias and various writs such as writs of attachment in child custody cases
- Communications (*dispatch*) and 911 operations are also the responsibility of the Sheriff in most counties in Texas

Constable

- Have all the enforcement powers of any other peace officers and often participate actively in criminal investigations
- Typically one per precinct per county and elected every four years
- Duties generally include;
 - Providing bailiffs for the justice of the peace court(s) within his/her precinct and serving process issued there and from any other court
 - Focus on truancy cases
 - Serves as bailiff for the justice courts, serves subpoenas and other process and plays an important role in making sure the judgments rendered in civil cases are satisfied
- Duties related to keeping accounts of the financial transactions of the office and is responsible for property seized or money collected by court order

Police Officer

- Enforces federal and state laws and local ordinances in their specific jurisdiction / city
- Performs a variety of duties relative to assigned area of responsibility such as;
 - Identifying and apprehending criminal violators
 - Ensuring the free flow of traffic
 - Executing warrants of arrest and assisting in serving warrants
 - Ensuring the safe and legal operation of jail
 - Presenting crime prevention programs
 - Patrol an assigned area by car, motorcycle, bicycle, or on foot to discourage crime, maintaining responsibility and accountability for assigned geographic area
 - Build and maintain effective partnerships with community groups and members and respond to requests and inquiries from citizens concerning laws and city ordinances

County

County Judge

- Under Texas law, the County Judge serves as chief executive officer of the county
- Involved in almost all aspects of county government, including preparing the county budget and presiding over Commissioners Court

Community/Social Services

- Provides short-term assistance for emergency needs such as utilities, groceries, medications, and rental/mortgage assistance
- Provides for the general relief of indigents
- Provides burial of paupers

Emergency Management

- Regulates burn bans in unincorporated areas
- Develop, maintain and coordinate a comprehensive emergency management plan
- · Implements programs to increase public awareness about threats and hazards
- Coordinates emergency planning
- Provides an extensive array of specialized training for emergency responders and local officials
- Administers disaster recovery and hazard mitigation programs

Engineering

- Constructs, maintains and repairs county roadways and bridges
- Inspects/permits construction projects of all kind in the unincorporated areas within a county
 - Development inspections
 - Right-of-way inspections
 - Electrical utility permit
 - Gas utility permit
 - Water utility permit
 - Subdivision platting
 - Driveway permitting and construction
- Provides project engineering services for county projects
- Performs commercial building and site permitting and review for the unincorporated areas within a county
- Performs residential permitting and review for the unincorporated areas within a county
- Performs storm water quality and wastewater permitting and review for the unincorporated areas within a county
- Provides watershed protection inspections for the unincorporated areas within a county
- Also responsible for:
 - county road drainage
 - Herbicide treatment
 - Right-of-way mowing
 - Street sweeping
 - Culvert/pipe instillation
 - Installation, maintenance and repair of county street signs and barricades
 - county road striping

County continued

Health System

- Provides health care services to eligible residents through the counties, hospital districts and public hospitals
- Provides services for the deaf and hard of hearing
- Provides indigent burials
- Promotes health, prevent disease and protect communities
- Seeks to help residents live long and healthy lives through the assurance of environmental quality, the access to personal health services and the dissemination of information to make wise health decisions

Housing

- Promotes innovative housing communities and encourage our clients
- to achieve self-sufficiency
- Provides communities with jobs
- Helps to establish neighborhoods
- Promotes balance and stability for families and individuals who might otherwise not have access to these services

Parks and Recreation

- Develops and maintains active parks, leased parks and community centers in the county
- Preserves natural and historic resources in the county
- Provides appropriate recreation programs and activities for youth, adults, and senior citizens in accordance with the adopted master plan and needs assessment in the county
- Provides building and lawn maintenance for all county structures and facilities

Regional

Council of Government (COG)

- Defined to serve an area of several counties; the COG addresses issues such as regional and municipal planning, economic and community development, cartography and GIS, hazard mitigation and emergency planning, aging services, water use, pollution control, transit administration, and transportation planning
- Many COGs establish and host region-wide geographical information systems (GIS) as well as databases on regional population, economic, and land-use patterns
- COGs are voluntary associations that represent member local governments, mainly cities and counties, that seek to provide cooperative planning, coordination, and technical assistance on issues of mutual concern that cross jurisdictional lines
- Plans and implements regional homeland security strategies
- Operates law enforcement training academies
- · Promotes regional municipal solid waste and environmental quality planning
- Provides cooperative purchasing options for governments
- Manages region-wide services to the elderly
- Maintains and improves regional 9-1-1 systems
- Promotes regional economic development
- Operates specialized transit systems
- Provides management services for member governments
- Responsible for regional planning activities that may differ from region to region, but typically
 include planning for economic growth, water supply and water quality, air quality, transportation,
 emergency preparedness, and the coordinated delivery of various social services

Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO)

- A federally mandated and federally funded transportation policy-making organization in the United States that is made up of representatives from local government and governmental transportation authorities
- Allocates federal and other transportation funding resources appropriately, according to the region's shared vision for its future and a comprehensive examination of the region's future and investment alternatives
- Facilitates collaboration of governments, interested parties, and residents in the planning process
- Establishes a setting
 - Establish and manage a fair and impartial setting for effective regional decision-making in the metropolitan area
- Evaluates alternatives
 - Evaluate transportation alternatives, scaled to the size and complexity of the region, to the nature of its transportation issues, and to realistically available options
- Maintains a long-range transportation plan (LRTP)
 - Develop and update a fiscally constrained long-range transportation plan for the metropolitan area covering a planning horizon of at least twenty years that fosters
 - Mobility and access for people and goods.
 - Efficient system performance and preservation, and
 - Quality of life
- Develops a transportation improvement program (*TIP*)
 - Develop a fiscally constrained program based on the long-range transportation plan and designed to serve the metropolitan area's goals while using spending, regulating, operating, management, and financial tools

Regional continued

- Involves the public
 - Involve the general public and all the significantly affected sub-groups in the four essential functions listed above.
- Protects air quality
 - Transportation plans, programs, and projects must conform with the air quality plan, known as the "state implementation plan" (SIP), for the state within which the metropolitan area lies
- Has no authority to raise revenues such as to levy taxes on their own
- Funding for the operations of an MPO comes from a combination of federal transportation funds and required matching funds from state and local governments

Houston-Galveston Area Council (HGAC)

- H-GAC is the Council of Governments and Metropolitan Planning Organization for the 13-county region that includes these counties:
 - Austin
 - Brazoria
 - Chambers
 - Colorado
 - Fort Bend
 - Galveston
 - Harris
 - Liberty
 - Matagorda
 - Montgomery
 - Walker
 - Waller
 - Wharton
- It is a voluntary association of local governments and is governed by a Board of Directors that consists of local elected officials from member governments
- H-GAC provides technical assistance to communities to address issues that go beyond individual city boundaries and offers services to help use resources more efficiently and improve the region's quality of life and economic competitiveness
- Key services include transportation planning, cooperative purchasing, homeland security, air and water quality planning, population forecasting, and workforce development

State Agencies

Texas Department of Transportation

- · Plans and makes policies for the location, construction and maintenance of state highways
- Oversees the design, construction, maintenance and operation of the state highway system
- Develops a statewide transportation plan that contains all modes of transportation, including highways and turnpikes, aviation, mass transportation, railroads, high-speed railroads and water traffic
- Awards contracts for the improvement of the state highway system.
- Encourages, fosters and assists in the development of public and mass transportation in the state
 - Oversees highway, aviation, rail and public transportation systems in the state
 - Builds and maintains interstate, US, and state highways, as well as farm-to-market roads throughout the state

Texas Department of Public Safety

- Responsible for statewide law enforcement and vehicle regulation
 - Driver License/ID Card Renewal
 - Driver License Address Change
 - Driver License Reinstatement and Status
 - Driver Record
 - Driver Responsibility Program
 - Track Driver License/ID Card
 - Administers the Concealed Handgun Licensing Program
 - Obtaining a concealed hand gun, hunting and/or fishing license

- Oversees and protects wildlife and their habitats
- Responsible for managing the state's parks and historical areas
- Provides hunting, fishing and outdoor recreation opportunities

Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ)

- Enforces environmental regulations
- Responds to emergencies and natural disasters that threaten human health
- Oversees dam safety
- Monitors air quality within Texas
- Oversees all of our air permitting activities
- Implements plans to protect and restore air quality in cooperation with local, regional, state, and federal stakeholders
- Tracks progress toward environmental goals, adapting plans
- Implements federal and state laws related to the regulation of aboveground and underground petroleum storage tanks (PSTs)
- Generation, treatment, storage, and disposal of municipal, industrial, low-level radioactive, and hazardous wastes
- Recovery and processing of uranium and disposal of byproduct
- Oversees state cleanup of contaminated sites
- Responsible for all aspects of planning, permitting, and monitoring to protect the state's water resources
- Issues air and water operating permits to businesses operating in Texas
- Responsible for the general supervision and oversight of districts and utilities, including the processing of petitions to create districts and applications to approve utility service areas
- Maintains approval authority over many utility matters including the review of most district bond issues and of the rates charged by privately owned and member-owned utilities

Texas Department of Agriculture

- Promotes production agriculture, consumer protection, economic development and healthy living
- Responsible for matters pertaining to agriculture, rural community affairs, and related matters

Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission

- Regulates all phases of the alcoholic beverage industry in Texas
- Duties of the commission include regulating sales, taxation, importation, manufacturing, transporting, and advertising of alcoholic beverages
- TABC agents are fully empowered state police officers with state-wide criminal jurisdiction and may make arrests for any offense

State Agencies continued

Texas Attorney General

- Charged by the state constitution to defend the laws and constitution of Texas, represent the state in litigation, and approve public bond issues
- Serves as legal counsel to all boards and agencies of state government, issues legal opinions when requested by the governor, heads of state agencies and other officials and commissions, and defends challenges to state laws and suits against both state agencies and individual employees of the state
- Represents the Director of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice in appeals from criminal convictions in federal courts
- Responsible for ensuring that Texas government is open and accessible to all citizens
- Provides protection for consumers
 - Car buying, car repairs, catalog and online sales,, charitable giving, charitable raffles, credit cards, credit repair, debt collection, debt management, disaster scams, health care, home buying, home remodeling / repair, identity theft, insurance, internet, investments and securities, loans, lotteries and sweepstakes, Medicaid fraud, mortgage fraud, moving and travel, nursing homes, prescription drugs, price gouging, product safety, rebates, spam, telemarketers, tenant rights, utilities, etc.
- Assists victims of violent crimes by administering the Crime Victims' Compensation Program and victim service-related grants and contracts, in addition to offering training and outreach programs
- Charged with proceedings to secure child support through its Child Support Division

Texas Department of Family and Protective Services

- Responsible for investigating charges of abuse, neglect or exploitation of children, elderly adults and adults with disabilities
- Protects children and adults who are elderly or have disabilities
- Regulates child care
- Protects the health and safety of children in daycare, as well as foster care and other types of 24-hour care

Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs

- Responsible for homeownership, affordable rental housing, community and energy assistance programs, and colonia activities serving primarily low income Texans
- Headquartered at 221 East 11th Street in Austin
- Acts as a conduit for federal grant funds for housing and community services
- Operates as a housing finance agency
- Serves as a financial and administrative resource that helps provide essential services and affordable housing opportunities to Texans who qualify for this assistance based on their income level

State Agencies continued

Texas General Land Office (GLO)

- Manages state-controlled lands and mineral rights properties
- Leases the state's vast land and mineral holdings for energy and mineral development with the proceeds going into the Permanent School Fund (PSF) to help finance K-12 education in Texas
- Archives and Records is home to more than 35.5 million documents and 80,000 maps, dating back to the year 1720, tracing the history of Texas' public lands

Texas Health and Human Services Commission

- Oversees the operations of the health and human services system
- Provides administrative oversight of Texas health and human services programs
- Provides direct administration of some programs
- Programs administered by HHSC
- Medicaid
- Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP)
- Texas Women's Health Program
- Temporary Assistance for Needy Families
- SNAP Food Benefits and Nutritional Programs
- Family Violence Services
- Refugee Services
- Disaster Assistance

Texas Railroad Commission

- Regulates the oil and gas industry, gas utilities, pipeline safety, safety in the liquefied petroleum gas industry, and surface coal and uranium mining

Texas Court System

Supreme Court

- Hears appeals involving civil matters and does not hear any appeals involving criminal matters
 except when the defendant is a juvenile
- Maintains responsibility for attorney licensing and discipline

Court of Criminal Appeals

- · Hears appeals on criminal cases excluding those involving juvenile proceedings
- Cases in which the death penalty was imposed are directly and automatically appealed to this court, bypassing the lower Courts of Appeals

Court of Appeals

- Has intermediate appellate jurisdiction in both civil and criminal cases
- Death penalty cases are automatically appealed to the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals and bypass this level

District

- Exclusive jurisdiction on felony cases, cases involving title to land, and election contest cases
- Shares jurisdiction with the county courts, and in some case justice of the peace courts, for civil cases (its lowest limit for hearing a case is a mere \$200 in controversy, while JP courts can hear cases up to \$10,000)
- Shares jurisdiction over divorces, child custody and support matters, adoptions and child welfare cases with county courts at law
- District court judges are required to be licensed attorneys

Probate

- Handles matters of probate, guardianship, trust, and mental health
- Hears condemnation cases
- There are no jurisdictional monetary limits on the types of lawsuits that a statutory probate court may hear
- Their jurisdiction at times overlaps that of the district court

County

- Has appellate jurisdiction over JP and municipal court cases (for municipal court cases, this may involve a trial de novo if the lower court is not a "court of record"), exclusive jurisdiction over "Class A" and "Class B" misdemeanors (these offenses can involve jail time), and concurrent jurisdiction over civil cases where the amount in controversy is moderately sized
- Unlike the County Judge, judges of the county courts of law are required to be attorneys

Texas Court System continued

Municipal

- · Comes into contact with more defendants than all other Texas courts combined
- The subject matter of municipal courts relates to crimes relating to public safety and quality of life issues
- Primary venue for acts of misconduct committed by children
- Within the city limits, these courts have shared jurisdiction with the JP courts on Class C criminal misdemeanor cases, and have exclusive jurisdiction on cases involving city ordinances
- Has limited civil jurisdiction over public matters relating to public safety (e.g., dangerous dog determinations)
- Not a "courts of record" (*i.e., no written transcript of the proceedings was taken*), and thus an appeal to the county level would require a whole new trial (*i.e., a trial de novo*)
- Generally appealed to the county court level, but cannot be appealed beyond that level unless the fine is more than \$100 or a constitutional matter is asserted

Justice of the Peace

- Lowest court level in Texas
- Original jurisdiction in "criminal matters of misdemeanor cases punishable by fine only" (called "Class C" misdemeanor cases under the Texas Penal Code)
- Exclusive jurisdiction in "civil matters where the amount in controversy is \$200 or less"
- Top limit on civil matters are up to \$10,000
- Right to hear cases involving eviction as well as cases involving foreclosure and liens against personal property where the amount falls within the (revised) JP Court's jurisdiction
- JP cases are appealed to the county court level where the case results in a trial de novo
- In criminal cases, cases beginning in justice court cannot be appealed beyond the county level court unless the fine is more than \$100 or a constitutional matter is asserted

Family

- Decide on matters and render judgments relating to families and children
- Types of cases heard in family courts include divorce, child custody, child support, visitation rights, protective orders and the emancipation of minors

Juvenile

- Decide on matters involving adolescents who have not attained the age of majority
- Types handled by the juvenile courts include criminal misconduct, juvenile delinquency and issues of neglect

To ensure that all permitting requirements are met, you should contact the local county and/or city government in which you plan to conduct business to determine if there are any additional requirements.



Report a water leak?

If you are inside the city, you should contact your city's public works department or utility department. You can also check your city's website or call your city secretary and/or city's customer service department. Most major cities have a "311" number that allows you to call for reporting water leaks if you are inside of the city limits. If you receive service from a utility district, you will need to contact that specific utility district and the phone number can be found on your water bill.

Your city or utility district is responsible for maintaining the service line leading to your home or business's meter and the meter itself. The property owner is responsible for the service line behind the meter and the rest of the property's plumbing.
